



INTRODUCTION

This "How To Find" guide is designed to enable the user to obtain—quickly and easily—an up-to-date and accurate citation to the United States Statutes at Large and the United States Code.

In using the research procedure chart, beginning on pages 2 and 3, the reader should read the items from left to right across the two pages.

The *first* column contains the typical references which require further citing, which are (1) Revised Statutes section, (2) date of law, (3) name of law, (4) number of law, (5) Statutes citation, and (6) Code citation; the *second, third,* and *fourth* columns point to the official published volumes in which the citations may be found and suggest logical sequences to follow in making the search; *column five* suggests additional finding aids, some of which especially are useful for citing current legislation; and the *last* column shows some examples of the citations resulting from following the steps in the chart.

The careful following of the steps set forth carries the assurance that each search will be complete and that all appropriate points will be covered.

Publications referred to in abbreviated form are identified and described in a convenient list on pages 8 and 9.

Government Publications: A. Principal Finding Aids	
1. Slip law	A pamphlet print of each public and private law enacted by Congress, issued a few days after a bill becomes law; public (but not private) slip laws carry the Statutes page numbers that will be their permanent citation in a future Statutes volume, marginal notes and citations (including U.S. Code and D.C. Code classifications of current legislation), and a guide to legislative history (which also contains dates of related Presidential statements); text of both public and private laws with annotations are later cumulated and bound as part of the Stat. volume.
2. Stat	United States Statutes at Large; contains all public and private laws and concurrent resolutions enacted during a session of Congress, plus reorganization plans, proposed and ratified amendments to the Constitution, and proclamations by the President, with finding aids including legislative history, subject index, and Laws Affected Tables (see item 5 below); arrangement is chronological by approval date in each category; by law, these volumes are "legal evidence" (1 U.S.C. 112); only the general and permanent laws are codified (arranged by subject in titles) in the U.S.C.
3. U.S.C	United States Code and its annual, cumulative supplements; published every six years; only the general and permanent laws of the United States are codified (arranged by subject in titles) in the U.S. Code; temporary, local, or private laws are not included; the Code establishes "prima facie the laws of the United States" except "whenever titles of such Code shall have been enacted into positive law the text thereof shall be legal evidence" (1 U.S.C. 204(a)); to date, 20 titles and subtitle IV of Title 49 have been enacted into positive law; contains list of Acts by popular name, index and tables.
4. U.S.C. Supplement	Annual, cumulative supplements to the United States Code; contains all changes in or additions to the general and permanent laws and Code ancillaries since the last edition of the Code.
B. Others 5 Laws Affected Tables	Published in each Statutes volume, from 1956 through 1976,
5. Laws Affected Tables	showing the prior laws affected by the public laws in each volume; after 1976 Statutes volume, the Tables were discontinued, and are no longer prepared.
6. Laws Affected Tables for 1956–1970 and 1971–1975.	15-year cumulation and 5-year cumulation, published separately; contains Index of Popular Name Acts Affected; cumulations are no longer prepared and were discontinued after the 1971–1975 cumulation.
7. House Calendar	Calendars of the U.S. House of Representatives and History of Legislation (1 publication)—very useful for following day-to-day progress of legislation through both Houses of Congress; index, usually on Mondays; final edition covers the session (1st) or the Congress (end of 2d session).
8. Index Analysis of the Federal Statutes, 1789-1873; Index to the Federal Statutes,	Subject index covering all general and permanent laws through 46 Stat. (Mar. 4, 1931); useful for tracing early legislation.

9. U.S.C. Cong. and Adm. News.	United States Code Congressional and Administrative News—published at least monthly during each session of Congress; monthly when Congress is not in session. Gives slip law information, including legislative history; has subject index, list of popular name acts, tables; material is currently supplemental to and annually codified in U.S.C.A.
 U.S.C.A. and supplements. 	United States Code Annotated—an annotated version of the U.S. Code with periodic supplements and annual, cumulative pocket parts.
11. U.S.C.S. and supplements.	United States Code Service—annotated version of U.S. Code with monthly advance service containing text of slip laws, proclamations, etc., and cumulative tables and index; annual, cumulative pocket parts.
